

CII Spotlight: Nikki Tyler

Q: What is your role at USAID?

A: I joined the CII team in March 2015 as a Market Access Advisor. In this role, I work on the development and implementation of market-based strategies to accelerate adoption of priority health solutions and products. Currently, I am working on introduction planning around chlorhexidine, bCPAP, and pneumonia diagnostics. CII is also in the process of creating a country-level scaling guide – part of our series Idea to Impact — to provide additional guidance to users in thinking about how to prioritize countries for product scale-up and how to create a comprehensive scale-up strategy and implementation plan. Q: How did you end up at USAID?

A: My mom is a former Peace Corps volunteer who, among her other wonderful qualities (hi, mom!), wanted my sister and me to experience other cultures/places.
